THE WISE STILL SEEK HIM

<u>Pastor's Pen</u>

The man in our Gospel today was deaf. He was either born that way or else it had happened very early in life. Because he could not hear, his power of speech had never fully developed. I think St. Mark records this tender and triumphant story because it speaks to us of Christ and human suffering.

Let us think first of the fact of misery. The fact of human suffering is relentlessly real. It can stem from any one of a number of sources. Sometimes it comes from nature. An earthquake can devastate an entire city. Babies are born blind; hurricanes level villages. A flood wipes out businesses and lives, and breaks up bodies and homes.

Sometimes the suffering comes from human relationships. People hurt each other with words or with guns. Entire populations take up arms and go to war. Thousands are killed, and untold thousands are left scarred in body and mind. Look at Iraq. As the killing and suffering continue, the hatred grows.

Then, of course, many are living through their own quiet drama of sorrow and struggle. It is that kind of world. Human suffering is not a figment of the imagination. It is very real and very prevalent.

Let us consider in the second place the mystery of suffering. Questions abound. Why, in God's world, should there be deaf man with a speech impediment? Walk through the wards of a great hospital. Why should there be such a thing as disease germs? Why war? Why slums? Why birth defects? Why floods? Why poverty? These are the questions that have plagued the minds of thinking men and women for centuries. And the first thing Christ does to the mystery of suffering is to heighten and accentuate the difficulty. It is our Christian faith that creates the mystery. There is no real problem for the people who have never accepted the message of Christ. Suffering is

suffering; it's just that kind of world, an accident of nature like everything else. But the Christian revelation says, "God is love"; and that creates a problem.

However, if the man who rejects the Christian revelation escapes the mystery of evil, he is faced with another problem, the mystery of good. It is difficult to explain the presence of evil in the world of a loving God, but it is impossible to explain goodness in a world where there is no God at all. The problem of evil and suffering is very difficult when we believe in a loving God, but the problem of goodness is impossible when we do not.

A final thought concerns the mystery of suffering. The story in our Gospel had a happy ending. Jesus healed the man of his deafness and speech impediment and sent him on his way. Most stories of human suffering do not end that way. Most of us have to face the suffering and live with it and work through it. This was true of Jesus Himself. He endured it and transformed it from tragedy to triumph. That is the Christian answer to the mystery of suffering, not so much an explanation as an understanding and reinforcing presence. The Gospel says that Jesus looked up to heaven and sighed. It was a spontaneous utterance of genuine sorrow in sympathy with human suffering. That in itself is an encouraging message. It means that Christ shares the experiences of suffering that come our way.

The relationship of Christ to the fact of human suffering has never been in supplying a theory to explain it, but rather in furnishing power to surmount it. Jesus never said, I have explained the world, but He did say, "Be of good courage, I have overcome it." He faced the worst this world can give and turned it from defeat to victory. Now He offers that same victory to each of us, if only we have the faith and courage to claim it as our own.

Today's Second Reading: James 2:1-5

Children learn language from listening. What they hear they often add to their vocabularies. Children take their cues for behavior by watching. This does not end as we age. Teenagers copy their friends. If the most popular kid in the school were to wear purple jeans, shortly thereafter several more will be wearing them, and then even more.

We don't change as adults: What's the boss wearing? What kind of car is my best friend driving? How nice is my neighbor's landscaping? Our "copycatting" as adults doesn't change, it just gets more expensive.

Emulating someone else is not necessarily a bad thing, that is, if we pick the right person to emulate. James is suggesting that a person of faith will be drawn to emulate only one person - Jesus.

Acts identifies James as being a "pillar" in the Church in Jerusalem. It is this James who most likely wrote this letter. Being somehow very close to Jesus would have given him particular insight into Jesus. This is seen in that he bases much of his letter on the Sermon on the Mount. The point of James is that faith will give evidence to its presence within a person. Faith without works cannot be called faith. For James, faith must produce something. Faith is not a gift to be merely possessed. It is not merely an intellectual exercise, and it is more than a conviction of the heart. If faith is in the heart, then the person is inspired to act on faith. If we possess faith, we are going to pattern our lives after Jesus. Just as teenagers wish to look like their friends, a person of faith is motivated to look like Jesus.

James tells us that a Christian should show "no partiality." This comes from the Hebrew legal tradition. Just like our phrase that "Justice is blind," Hebrew law insisted that one's appearance or social position must not determine how a person is treated by the court.

James tell us that faith in Jesus makes this attitude a part of Christian life. How much more could we offend Jesus Christ by excluding someone from our community -- or especially our time of prayer -- based on their appearance or our judgment of them?

Isaiah is writing to comfort the people of Judah. The northern kingdom of Israel has fallen to Assyria. Assyria was a particularly vicious country, and the southern kingdom was living in fear that they were next. Isaiah gives courage that God stands with them, they should not be afraid. This reliance on God will create a new day when all imperfection and sin will be wiped away.

Mark picks up Isaiah's prophecy and shows Jesus fulfilling the promise that the deaf shall hear. This is particularly important for deafness was seen as a horrible impediment. The Word of God was a spoken word. If you could not hear the Scriptures, you could never hear God. Jesus not only made it possible for this man to hear God, He made it possible for the man to praise God.

Jesus wants us to listen and to praise. He came to introduce us to the Father. He showed us how to live a life worthy of God. James is urging us to watch and learn. The man Jesus healed was not Jewish. He was a Gentile, yet Jesus reached out to Him anyway. As Christians, if we possess real faith, we will quit alienating people. We will refrain from judging. We will drop our prejudices. We will build bridges, not burn them. We will seek to reconcile, not cast out.

Faith must manifest itself in good. Hopefully, it will manifest itself in how well we emulate Jesus.
